What is the problem you are trying to solve?

SAIL members want to ensure that when individuals have an emergency and must ride in an ambulance or other emergency vehicles, their medical equipment and medical aids, such as a wheelchair or a walker, go to the location they are going. What we don't want to see happen is expensive equipment being left on the street that might get stolen or left at home, which is no help to the person as they recover.

What is your proposed solution?

SAIL wants to work with the Legislature,
State Agencies, emergency response
personel, and County transit authorities to
help create a plan to transport medical
equipment or aides for those in emergency
situations. This will require better
networking between emergency and
transportation services, as well as Federal
and/or State Services that might be needed to
pay for the transport.



Why is this a good solution?

- People who have their medical equipment with them will be able to recover faster.
- People who have their communication aides with them will be able to communicate with medical professionals.
- Creating a clear plan and budget to pay for transport will give people with disabilities and their families a peace of mind before emergencies happen.
