What to Watch for:

HB 2319 Renaming certain state residential facilities for persons with developmental disabilities.

HB 2200: Increasing access to data related to the safety and stability of residential settings for individuals with developmental disabilities.

HB 2230 Streamlining monitoring and oversight activities related to community residential service business providers.

HB 2350 Increasing transparency regarding residential habilitation center compliance with certain federal requirements.

HB 2415 Concerning unexpected fatalities of residents of department of social and health services facilities.

HB 2230 Streamlining monitoring and oversight activities related to community residential service business providers.
