### 2.) What is an ABLE Account?

ABLE Accounts are a type of tax-advantaged savings account for people with disabilities.

**Why do I need one?** Some benefits programs have asset limits, like SSI and some types of Medicaid; if a person has more than \$2,000 in savings, they don't qualify for those programs. Money in an ABLE account does not count as an asset for SSI or Medicaid, and a person can save up to \$19,000/year in an ABLE account without impacting their benefits eligibility.

**What is the big change?** Right now, people with qualifying disabilities that started before the age of 26 are eligible for an ABLE account. Beginning in January 2026, *people with qualifying disabilities that started before the age of 46 will be eligible for an ABLE account.* This means that a lot more people will be eligible to start saving money, while protecting their benefits!

**6.) Effective Dec. 8, 2025,** priority of service categories 1 and 2 are closed at DSHS' Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. This means all categories (categories 1 through 5) are closed and participants who apply for DVR services and are determined eligible will be placed on a waiting list. This is part of a process called Order of Selection.

An Order of Selection, or OOS, is how DVR prioritizes services for people who need them most. A waiting list is required by federal law when DVR does not have sufficient resources to serve all eligible participants. We reevaluate our service delivery capacity regularly to ensure we continue serving the greatest number of eligible individuals possible in the most effective manner.

# KO1 Medicaid

## What is KO1 Medicaid?

Washington State's KO1 Medicaid provides Medicaid/Apple Health coverage for children who have stayed in a hospital, care facility, or NICU for 30 consecutive days or longer—including transfers between facilities without returning home—and who do not otherwise qualify for Medicaid/Apple Health.

## Eligibility for KO1 Medicaid:

- Parents' income and assets are not counted for eligibility.
- If a child has private health insurance, KO1 Medicaid provides secondary coverage for out-of-pocket costs like co-pays, and families may also qualify for the [Medicaid Premium Payment Program](#), which reimburses private health insurance costs while the child receives Apple Health coverage.

**Children can remain on KO1 Medicaid through the month they turn 6 years old, regardless of income changes.**

## Benefits of KO1 Medicaid



### Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Nutrition Program

A KO1 infant qualifies for WIC until age 5, receiving formula. Includes support for other children under 5 and for the mother until the KO1 infant turns one.



### No Co-pays/Deductibles

KO1 helps cover costs not paid by private insurance



### Transportation Services

Gas vouchers, bus passes, or taxis for medical trips, including NICU visits. Scan the QR code for your local provider



### Dental and Vision Coverage

Include dental and vision coverage for the child



### Diapers assistance

After the KO1 child turns 3 years old with a qualifying medical diagnosis

## Emerging Threats to Infants and Children PARTNERSHIP PROJECT: PHASE 4 KICKOFF

Phase 4 of the Emerging Threats Partnership Project officially launched on December 5, 2025! At the kickoff meeting, AAP staff highlighted key team accomplishments from phase 3, including:

- Enhancing communication
- Identifying gaps and barriers
- Implementing data-informed initiatives
- Increasing awareness, education, and resources related to congenital CMV, congenital syphilis, and perinatal hepatitis C

Building on previous progress, phase 4 focuses on strengthening partnerships, expanding communication, and broadening the reach of initiatives. The five returning teams—Arkansas, Arizona, Colorado, Iowa, and Pennsylvania—shared proposed plans that include identifying new partners, developing strategies to increase impact, and expanding scope to address additional emerging health threats. As teams continue advancing efforts supportive of an effective system of care that protects infants and children from emerging threats, AAP national is providing additional resources to support teams during phase 4. In addition to resource development, this phase introduces enhanced assistance through monthly newsletters, a dedicated collaboration space, and a proposed virtual learning opportunity anticipated to launch in Summer 2026.

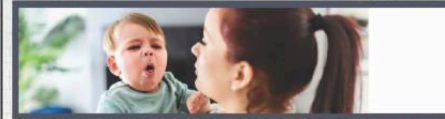
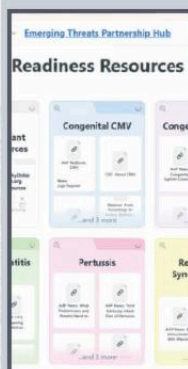
