Equity and Diversity

Layers of Diversity

Including people who have racial and ability differences can and should be key to creating an inclusive future. People with disabilities come from all backgrounds, yet not enough of us come to the meetings where disability policies are discussed. We need to seek input from people with disabilities from all races so that our society can address the challenges that disabled people face when they have other marginalized identities. These identities include racial, neurological, and LGBTQ+ communities who have been marginalized by history. Diversity can be accomplished if we can make the system equitable for all trying to use it.

Equality for all

To make the system work for all people with disabilities, the systems that deliver services to us need to understand that we have layers of barricades. On top of our disabilities, people who are of color, indigenous backgrounds, immigrants and LGBTQ+ (Lesbian, Gay, Bi-sexual, Trans, Queer or other identities) are challenged to find services that are structured for their communities. This increases the chances that people will not get the support from the state due to trust and misunderstanding about what a service can provide. Access to culturally sensitive materials can assist people with disabilities as they navigate through social services.

Equity takes all of us

At SAIL, we appreciate people with disabilities from all racial and social backgrounds who want to impact policy. We believe that all voices are necessary for us to write and present effective policy solutions which would reflect our population. Joining together will help us as a community better understand all concerns and viewpoints as we discuss new ideas for policies.

Solution

We need to accept the contributions people with disabilities make to society and the creative solutions to obstacles that they have thought of. These solutions are based on inclusion of people with disabilities and their ability to see a societal benefit to a more inclusive world. Outreach and listening are integral parts of including people from diverse communities with disabilities.
